



Plan:

- Visit places that may need some paint. Take pictures to help compare and decide.
- Get the appropriate permission to paint in your site.
- Consider how to minimize your project's environmental impact.
- What equipment and gear are required?
- Divide out the jobs.
- When will you paint? Remember to check the weather forecasts.

Do:

- Visit a park, schoolyard, or camp and put a fresh coat of paint where it's needed!

Review:

- What do you know now that you did not know before?
- Did the group work well as a team? Why or why not?
- How did you feel before, during, and after this activity?
- Did you have fun? Why or why not?
- What would you do differently in the future?

Safety note:

Discuss how to work safely with paint. Consider the ventilation of the area you're working in, and how to minimize your contact with paint and cleaners.
